- October 21: again at the farmers market, if we haven't sold out!

Note that initial bulb sales have been brisk, so please order quickly if you want some for your own garden. And they make lovely gifts!!

I recently sent out an email telling you all about the Hattie Ide Chaffe nursing home and their recently federated garden club. They are hosting a Community Gathering this Thursday, 21st, at 3:30.
